Modesty in Church Out of respect to our Lord, we beg all to appear in church modestly dressed. No shorts allowed. Ladies heads must be covered, no slacks or pants, low cut or sleeveless tops. Your cooperation is evidence of your love for our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and respect for the House of God.

Communion Fast Holy Communion may be received only by Catholics believing themselves to be in the state of Sanctifying Grace, who are observing at least one hour fast prior to reception of the Sacrament. We are urged, however, to observe the fast from midnight, or, at least for three hours. While always welcome, non-Catholics and those who do not accept the traditional teachings of the Church in matters of faith and morals, are NOT to receive Communion at this Mass. To receive Holy Communion do so in silence- do not say Amen.

Confession Procedure Begin your confession with "BLESS me Father for I have sinned", when you have received your penance, immediately begin your Act of Contrition.

Mass Requests \$20 stipend per Mass, intention box located on the wall in the gift shop.

Chapel Etiquette Food, drink and matches are not allowed. Please use the butane lighters to light the votive candles. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, genuflect on both knees and bow. Otherwise, genuflect with the RIGHT knee touching the floor.

OLHC is an independent Traditional Chapel. We maintain no association whatsoever with Kentucky Resistance.

No unapproved literature may be left on the premises. It will be discarded.

Need something blessed? The first Sunday of each month after each Mass. The next blessing is July 2nd. Please be there to pick up your item, it will not be held.

In the summer of 1977, Cardinal Timothy Manning of Los Angeles wrote to all the priests in his diocese telling them that beginning 20 November 1977 they must give Holy Communion in the hand to all those who requested it. With, as far as I know, only one exception, the clergy of this vast archdiocese accepted this instruction as if they had been noting down the date for a game of golf. In the parish of St. Dorothy in Glendora, by some miracle of grace, one priest did say "Enough is enough!" His name was Father Frederick F. Schell, S.J. Father Schell wrote a respectful letter to Cardinal Manning stating he could not in conscience distribute Holy Communion in the hand. He received what he described as an insolent and arrogant reply stating, "That's the way it's going to be." Father Schell's response was, "Not with me it isn't!" On Sunday, 13th November 1977, Father Schell preached a sermon denouncing Communion in the hand, and the next day he left the parish. Mr. William Bowman who lived in the San Fernando Valley, learned of Father's plight, urged him to come to Van Nuys and say Mass for conservatives, and promised to provide him with an apartment. Father Schell agreed and began his new apostolate in December of that year. Catholics in Orange County also asked him to come to their aid, which he did, and he eventually ended up offering Mass in other locations: Garden Grove, Ventura and Canoga Park [and Carlsbad.] In 1982, he formally disassociated himself from the Society of Jesus, remarking that they were once the greatest body of men ever, that he was grateful to them for the education and training that they had given him, but that they had become rotten. Father Schell decided not only that enough was enough, and that he would refuse to distribute Holy Communion in the hand, but that he would return to the Mass of his ordination [1947] and thereby revoke all the previous compromises which his Jesuit training had prompted him to make. "I am in an anomalous position" he remarked. "I should be subject to ecclesiastical authority, but I cannot do this without violating my reason and my conscience."

The result of his action was that, in the years from 1977 to 2002, literally thousands of good, faithful Catholics were able to worship as their fathers had worshipped, to keep their reverence for the Blessed Sacrament – in a word, to keep the Faith. He had also attained great peace of mind by finding a young, traditional priest, Father Patrick Perez, who had helped him for several years, and whose presence guaranteed the future of his apostolate.

Father Frederick Schell was a giant of the Faith who insisted on doing what he knew to be right, cost what it may. No priest in the United States is more deserving of the title, Defender of the Faith, the Faith of our Fathers. The tragic consequence of the Second Vatican Council is that Father Schell and priests who took the same stand, needed to defend the Faith against those who were themselves responsible for defending the Faith. ~ Michael Davies, London (2002)
