Modesty in Church Out of respect to our Lord, we beg all to appear in church modestly dressed. No shorts allowed. Ladies heads must be covered, no slacks or pants, low cut or sleeveless tops. Your cooperation is evidence of your love for our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and respect for the House of God.

Communion Fast Holy Communion may be received only by Catholics believing themselves to be in the state of Sanctifying Grace, who are observing at least one hour fast prior to reception of the Sacrament. We are urged, however, to observe the fast from midnight, or, at least for three hours. While always welcome, non-Catholics and those who do not accept the traditional teachings of the Church in matters of faith and morals, are NOT to receive Communion at this Mass. To receive Holy Communion do so in silence- do not say Amen.

Confession Procedure Begin your confession with "BLESS me Father for I have sinned", when you have received your penance, immediately begin your Act of Contrition.

Mass Requests \$20 stipend per Mass, intention box located on the wall in the gift shop.

Chapel Etiquette Food, drink and matches are not allowed. Please use the butane lighters to light the votive candles. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, genuflect on both knees and bow. Otherwise, genuflect with the RIGHT knee touching the floor.

OLHC is an independent Traditional Chapel. We maintain no association whatsoever with Kentucky Resistance.

No unapproved literature may be left on the premises. It will be discarded.

Need something blessed? The first Sunday of each month after each Mass. The next blessing will be March 2nd. Please be there to pick up your item, it will not be held.

Lost and Found Please remember to identify your Missals and prayer books for a safe return. If you have lost something, check the lost and found bin in the bookstore or table outside on Sundays and if you find something left in the pews, please return it to the bin to find its rightful owner.

The Feast of the Purification in conjunction with Candlemas, was certainly a day to be remembered! It began with Father Johnson robed in white cope for the blessing of the candles. Special robes are also worn for the other great blessings on the year, that of the ashes as Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, and again for the palms as Holy Week commences on Palm Sunday. The blessing concluded, Father led the congregation in a short procession. Upon his return, he changed his vesture to a white chasuble to begin a High Mass for the Feast of the Purification of Our Blessed Mother. The choir was of a special timbre, flawlessly singing the Latin of the Mass with organ accompaniment.

After Father left the sanctuary at the end of Mass, those who brought candles to be blessed gathered them together. Some had quite a good number and had to make more than a single trip. One parishioner in particular had several boxes of "DOMUS CHRISTI" 51% Beeswax [glassed] Sanctuary Lights. When she returned to get her last box, they were gone!!! **If you picked up a box of these by mistake**, please, please, return them as soon as you can! They are easily recognizable not only with the red, Domus Christi label, but the initials "YGV" handwritten in very large letters on all sides.

Speaking of lost-and-found Thanks to a very special volunteer, you will see that lost and found items will be arrayed on a table between the Chapel and the Hall every Sunday. If you've lost a personal belonging, please stop at the table; perhaps it has been turned in. Now, if you drop by for a visit during the weekdays and are searching for a lost possession, always check the Found Box in the Gift Shop! We caution you to be prompt! Any item not claimed within a month will become the property of the parish and disposed of properly.

Monday was the feast of St. Blaise, a physician become bishop, who was martyred in the persecution of the Governor of Cappadocia and Lesser Armenia, Agricola by name, under the Emperor Licinius in 316. St. Blaise was, before being beheaded, essentially skinned alive by being scraped with iron fleece combs. There was a time when a mother brought her young son, who had a fish bone lodged in his throat, to St. Blaise while he was in prison. St. Blaise took two blessed candles, crossed the candles over the lad's throat and prayed. Promptly the youngster coughed up the lodged bone! [Thanks to Barnhardt] Today after each Mass there will be Blessing of Throats. Simply approach the altar rail in an orderly fashion as you would to go to Communion.
