February 16, 2025 Septuagesima Sunday <u>Modesty in Church</u> Out of respect to our Lord, we beg all to appear in church modestly dressed. No shorts allowed. Ladies heads must be covered, no slacks or pants, low cut or sleeveless tops. Your cooperation is evidence of your love for our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and respect for the House of God.

Communion Fast Holy Communion may be received only by Catholics believing themselves to be in the state of Sanctifying Grace, who are observing at least one hour fast prior to reception of the Sacrament. We are urged, however, to observe the fast from midnight, or, at least for three hours. While always welcome, non-Catholics and those who do not accept the traditional teachings of the Church in matters of faith and morals, are NOT to receive Communion at this Mass. To receive Holy Communion do so in silence- do not say Amen.

<u>Confession Procedure</u> Begin your confession with "BLESS me Father for I have sinned", when you have received your penance, immediately begin your Act of Contrition.

<u>Mass Requests</u> \$20 stipend per Mass, intention box located on the wall in the gift shop.

<u>Chapel Etiquette</u> Food, drink and matches are not allowed. Please use the butane lighters to light the votive candles. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, genuflect on both knees and bow. Otherwise, genuflect with the RIGHT knee touching the floor.

<u>OLHC</u> is an independent Traditional Chapel. We maintain no association whatsoever with Kentucky Resistance.

No unapproved literature may be left on the premises. It will be discarded.

Need something blessed? The first Sunday of each month after each Mass. The next blessing will be March 2nd. Please be there to pick up your item, it will not be held.

Today is Septuagesima Sunday; we find ourselves on the threshold of Lent, a season of prayer and penance set apart by the Church to recall our Lord's 40 day fast in the desert and to prepare us for Easter. This season of preparation and sanctification can be fittingly accomplished through voluntary amendment of life, acts of penance and works of charity. Lent is a time to learn to love our souls more than our bodies. Thus every Christian should make a special effort to practice mortification and strive for holiness during the forty days of Lent. Do not let this time to grow in holiness pass you by! Consider the following categories if you need to fix a regimen for Lent.

- 1. Voluntary Amendment of Life: Give up those things now that you need to give up sooner or later, namely, bad habits. The goal here is to break a bad habit forever and Lent is a good time to do it. Love your soul more than your body! Examples: gossiping, surfing the web, television, over-eating, junk food, extended happy hours, complaining, bad language, video games, useless internet chatter, etc.
- 2. Acts of Penance: Perform some kind of penance. The goal here is to train yourself to say "no" to minor, legitimate things, making it easier to say "NO" to big temptations later. You may resume doing the legitimate things you have given up once Lent is over. Love your soul more than your body! Examples: avoid eating or drinking things you enjoy, or doing things you enjoy; rather do things you are disinclined toward and do them when they need to be done. Don't procrastinate!
- 3. Works of Charity: Perform some good and holy actions. The goal here is to strengthen your relationship with Christ and His Beloved Church. Ideally what you start here would continue in some way even after Lent is over. Love God more than yourself! Examples: daily Rosary, go to Mass an extra day of the week, spend additional time with the family or the sick, increasing spiritual reading or read Sacred Scriptures.
