July 27, 2025 Seventh Sunday after Pentecost St. Pantaleon, M <u>Modesty in Church</u> Out of respect to our Lord, we beg all to appear in church modestly dressed. No shorts allowed. Ladies heads must be covered, no slacks or pants, low cut or sleeveless tops. Your cooperation is evidence of your love for our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and respect for the House of God.

Communion Fast Holy Communion may be received only by Catholics believing themselves to be in the state of Sanctifying Grace, who are observing at least one hour fast prior to reception of the Sacrament. We are urged, however, to observe the fast from midnight, or, at least for three hours. While always welcome, non-Catholics and those who do not accept the traditional teachings of the Church in matters of faith and morals, are NOT to receive Communion at this Mass. To receive Holy Communion do so in silence- do not say Amen.

<u>Confession Procedure</u> Begin your confession with "BLESS me Father for I have sinned", when you have received your penance, immediately begin your Act of Contrition.

<u>Mass Requests</u> \$20 stipend per Mass, intention box located on the wall in the gift shop.

<u>Chapel Etiquette</u> Food, drink, cell phones and matches are not allowed. Please use the butane lighters to light the votive candles. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, genuflect on both knees and bow. Otherwise, genuflect with the RIGHT knee touching the floor.

This Tuesday, July 29, our dear friend and spiritual benefactor, Father Lawrence Smith in Wisconsin, will offer the fifth of a Novena of Masses with the intention of deliverance of our loved ones, and/or ourselves, from the influence, assaults and tyranny of Satan and his demons. To participate most fully in this endeavor, Father asks that you attend Mass or make a Spiritual Communion; including these intentions in your daily Rosary throughout the Novena of Masses, and pray the Novena to the Immaculate Conception in November. All parishioners of OLHC have been thusly enrolled.

ON FREQUENT COMMUNION~ Holy Communion is a divine repast which God bids us take, that supernatural life may be maintained within us. As our bodies cannot subsist upon one sole repast but require several reiterated repasts, in the same way the life of our souls can only be preserved by frequent communion. The bread which we must often eat in order to have strength to walk the road which leads from earth to heaven is the Eucharistic bread which makes men strong. Sorrowful experience shows us indeed that when we only rarely communicate, we neglect prayer and pious practices; we little watch over ourselves; allowing to be carried away by worldliness, love of pleasure, our own ease, by earthly possessions, and by pride. Whilst those communicating often and fervently prepare themselves for it by means of a better life in the days preceding it, and sanctifying in a better manner, the days which follow it. The grace of the sacrament sustains them, fortifies them, and enables them to make progress in virtue. Therefore, all pious souls ardently desire to often sit at the Holy Table, rejoicing at the approach of days of Communion and ravish when several follow one after another. It is with them as it is with heavenly spirits who feed continually upon God: never being satisfied - the more they communicate, the more they desire to communicate. Or, do we feel a kind of indifference, almost a dislike for the Bread of Angels? Absenting ourselves under the pretext that frequent communions would take up too much time, oblige us to lead a more holy life, inconvenience us, or constrain us to do violence to ourselves. Have we not even sometimes insinuated that to communicate so often is to be wanting in reverence to Jesus Christ? Such tepidity leaves the soul always in the same state, deriving no fruit from communion and no reformation of defects. With no progress in virtue is to accumulate upon our heads the abuse of graces.

Contrariwise, if we have the misfortune of familiarizing ourselves with communion, so as to make of it a routine which says nothing to the heart nor stirs the soul, is that not a great misfortune? Not to take to heart the work of our sanctification is to render ourselves unworthy of often eating the bread of the children of God. What to conclude? That we must absent ourselves from Holy Communion because we are too tepid? No! But that we must issue out from our tepidity and communicate often! In the words of The Apostle, "If any man will not work, neither let him eat." ~ Rev. M. Hamon, S.S. (Imp. 1804)
