Modesty in Church Out of respect to our Lord, we beg all to appear in church modestly dressed. No shorts allowed. Ladies heads must be covered, no slacks or pants, low cut or sleeveless tops. Your cooperation is evidence of your love for our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and respect for the House of God.

Communion Fast Holy Communion may be received only by Catholics believing themselves to be in the state of Sanctifying Grace, who are observing at least one hour fast prior to reception of the Sacrament. We are urged, however, to observe the fast from midnight, or, at least for three hours. While always welcome, non-Catholics and those who do not accept the traditional teachings of the Church in matters of faith and morals, are NOT to receive Communion at this Mass. To receive Holy Communion do so in silence- do not say Amen.

Confession Procedure Begin your confession with "BLESS me Father for I have sinned", when you have received your penance, immediately begin your Act of Contrition.

Mass Requests For the living, dead or special intentions- \$20 stipend per Mass, intention box located on the wall in the gift shop.

Chapel Etiquette Food, drink, cell phones and matches are not allowed. Please use the butane lighters to light the votive candles. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, genuflect on both knees and bow. Otherwise, genuflect with the RIGHT knee touching the floor.

OLHC is an independent Traditional Chapel. We maintain no association whatsoever with Kentucky Resistance.

No unapproved literature may be left on the premises. It will be discarded.

Need something blessed? The first Sunday of each month. The next blessing will be March 1st, please be there to pick up your item, it will not be held.

I hear the beat of distant feet drawing nearer and nearer, week by week, day by day. When will they arrive? Perhaps on Wednesday, March 11th the day of *Jog-A-Thon 2026!!!* Why of course!!! But between now and then, we have a lot of ground to cover! This year's goal is \$25,000, so you can bet our hard-working Padre Pio Academy students will be devising new, and clever ways of fundraising, yet not neglecting the tried-and-true methods. The typical method of jogathon support is to pledge, say a dollar per mile. Then the runner goes as far as he can until completely worn out, after which he hunts down the supporter to collect the pledged funds. The Academy has greatly simplified this procedure. Instead of a per-lap or per-mile pledge, we ask for a one-time donation up front, with the foreknowledge that our students will run lap after dizzying lap to "earn" their pledges. And how can we be so sure they will do so? Easy! Bribery! The students with the most laps win prizes. Might be pizza. Could be an ice cream party. Might even be a chance to win cheap electronic gizmos with short lifespans from the far east! Since our fundraising began, we have already raised over \$12,000! This in only a week and a half! We are well on the road to our goal! If you would choose to be a supporter (and we hope you do,) there are various means available. You may use Venmo, the QR code on the posters outside, send a donation to PPA, or easiest, stop by the Jog-A-Thon table in the breezeway to make your support known with cash or check.

Lent is coming! A season of prayer and penance set aside by the Church to prepare for Easter and to recall Our Lord's forty day fast in the desert. This season of preparation and sanctification can be fittingly accomplished through voluntary amendment of life, acts of penance, and works of charity. Lent is a time to learn to love our souls more than our bodies. Thus, every Catholic should make a special effort to practice mortification and to strive for holiness during the forty days of Lent. *Do not* let this time to grow in holiness pass you by! Consider another category on what you could do for Lent: *Acts of Penance*. Perform some kind of penance. Your goal here is to train yourself to say "no" to little things, so that you can easier say "NO" to greater temptations later. You may resume doing the legitimate things you have sacrificed once Lent is over. Love your soul more than your body! Examples: Avoid eating or drinking something that you enjoy, such as desserts, steaks, wine with dinner, or even all alcoholic beverages. Give up dining out, taking hot showers or sleeping in.

Prayer to overcome our Spiritual Enemies: Eternal wisdom, come down so powerfully into my soul, that all my enemies may be driven out; all my crimes melted away; all my sins forgiven. Enlighten my understanding with the light of true faith; inflame my will with Thy sweet love; clear my mind with Thy glad Presence; and give virtue and perfection to all my powers. Watch over me especially at my death, that I may come to enjoy Thy Beatific Vision in eternal bliss. Amen.
