Modesty in Church Out of respect to our Lord, we beg all to appear in church modestly dressed. No shorts allowed. Ladies heads must be covered, no slacks or pants, low cut or sleeveless tops. Your cooperation is evidence of your love for our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and respect for the House of God.

Communion Fast Holy Communion may be received only by Catholics believing themselves to be in the state of Sanctifying Grace, who are observing at least one hour fast prior to reception of the Sacrament. We are urged, however, to observe the fast from midnight, or, at least for three hours. While always welcome, non-Catholics and those who do not accept the traditional teachings of the Church in matters of faith and morals, are NOT to receive Communion at this Mass. To receive Holy Communion do so in silence- do not say Amen.

Confession Procedure Begin your confession with "BLESS me Father for I have sinned", when you have received your penance, immediately begin your Act of Contrition.

Mass Requests For the living, dead or special intentions- \$20 stipend per Mass, intention box located on the wall in the gift shop.

Chapel Etiquette Food, drink, cell phones and matches are not allowed. Please use the butane lighters to light the votive candles. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, genuflect on both knees and bow. Otherwise, genuflect with the RIGHT knee touching the floor.

OLHC is an independent Traditional Chapel. We maintain no association whatsoever with Kentucky Resistance.

No unapproved literature may be left on the premises. It will be discarded.

Need something blessed? The first Sunday of each month. The next blessing will be July 5th, please be there to pick up your item, it will not be held.

Padre Pio Academy News

Please God, today you may see some familiar faces who have been absent for a while: an absence due to the biannual Padre Pio Academy European Pilgrimage. Students (and their parents!) have invested a lot of time and work for the fundraising efforts that go into a pilgrimage: there's the weekly coffee and donuts after Sunday Mass, as well as occasional yardsales, among other events. Our four graduates, Paul Condon, Aimee Lewis, Catherine Packard and Owen Thuresson joined their confreres from Thomas More School in San Jose for a 20-day, 18-night journey to Vienna, Ljubljana, Zagreb, Malta and Rome.

The excursion formally began with a departure from San Francisco International Airport on May 28. First stop was Frankfurt Airport where students boarded a jump-flight to Vienna, concluding over 24 hours airtime! Whew! Once in Vienna, students were able to see, feel and breathe things only imagined at home. The capital of Austria, Vienna is certainly alpine. And the food! Mozart and Beethoven were at home here; students could almost feel them nearby as they walked the venerable city streets. Oh, and the food! Vienna is also known for its magnificent Imperial palaces, such as the Schonbrunn, and the Vienna Hofburg, both residences of the Habsburg dynasty. Then the stunning ancient churches as well. And do not forget the food!

Next stop, Ljubljana (loo-blee-AA-nuh), Capital of Slovenia (just across the Adriatic from Italy). An ancient city populated by even more-ancient peoples, it was once ruled by the Habsburgs and has been dominated by the Roman Catholic Church since the 8th century. It's hard to imagine the depth of culture found in this city.

Trieste, Italy, is only about an hour away, so why not? Students got their first taste of Italy and the Adriatic, enjoying a day of leisure!

Let us go forth to Zagreb, the northwestern capital of Croatia, distinguished by 18th and 19th century Austro-Hungarian architecture. At city's center, Upper Town, is the Gothic, twin-spired Zagreb Cathedral, as well as the 13th century St. Mark's Church, while Lower Town presents the main square with shopping, museums and parks.

The next morning, students prepared for a day in Croatia's Plitvice National Park, known for an impressive chain of 16 terraced lakes, joined by waterfalls extending into a limestone canyon. A system of connected walkways, hiking trails and bridges provided for exquisite views of this national heritage.

Stay tuned next week as students visit Malta, and then - on to Rome!
