Modesty in Church Out of respect to our Lord, we beg all to appear in church modestly dressed. No shorts allowed. Ladies heads must be covered, no slacks or pants, low cut or sleeveless tops. Your cooperation is evidence of your love for our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and respect for the House of God.

Communion Fast Holy Communion may be received only by Catholics believing themselves to be in the state of Sanctifying Grace, who are observing at least one hour fast prior to reception of the Sacrament. We are urged, however, to observe the fast from midnight, or, at least for three hours. While always welcome, non-Catholics and those who do not accept the traditional teachings of the Church in matters of faith and morals, are NOT to receive Communion at this Mass. To receive Holy Communion do so in silence- do not say Amen.

Confession Procedure Begin your confession with "BLESS me Father for I have sinned", when you have received your penance, immediately begin your Act of Contrition.

Mass Requests For the living, dead or special intentions- \$20 stipend per Mass, intention box located on the wall in the gift shop.

Chapel Etiquette Food, drink, cell phones and matches are not allowed. Please use the butane lighters to light the votive candles. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, genuflect on both knees and bow. Otherwise, genuflect with the RIGHT knee touching the floor.

OLHC is an independent Traditional Chapel. We maintain no association whatsoever with Kentucky Resistance.

No unapproved literature may be left on the premises. It will be discarded.

Need something blessed? The first Sunday of each. The next blessing will be August 2nd, please be there to pick up your item, it will not be held.

When last we met, before the sad events of a fortnight past, we were presenting a description of the biennial European Pilgrimage enjoyed by PPA high school seniors in conjunction with their confreres from Thomas More School in San Jose. While the students have long-since returned home, we shall with imagination, pick up with them in mid-air on the approach to Malta International Airport. Fasten your seatbelts *please!*

A midday arrival signaled a three day stay in Valletta, the tiny capital of this Mediterranean island-nation. The walled city was established in the 1500's on a peninsula by the Knights of St. John. It is known for its vast selection of museums, palaces and grand churches. Baroque landmarks include St. John's Co-Cathedral whose opulent interior is home to the Caravaggio masterpiece, the Beheading of St. John. So much to see; so little time!

ON TO ROME for a six-day stay!!! Landing at Fiumicino Airport, students were excited about the last leg and high point of their journey! But six days is a very quick visit in Rome. Let us follow: The Colosseum ~ We've all seen pictures but did you know it is the largest ancient amphitheater ever built? *And*, is the largest standing amphitheater in the world! Fit that on a postcard! Built of concrete and stone in 72 AD, it could hold 80,000 spectators watching gladiatorial contests and chariot events. The Trevi Fountain ~ Pope Urban VIII determined the earlier fountain insufficient and lacking in drama, and so was the cause of the construction of the present fountain in the mid 1600's. 86 feet in height and 161 in width, it is the largest baroque fountain in the city and certainly one of the most photographed and famous in the world.

Basilica di Sant'Eustachio ~ Named after St. Eustace, the earliest evidence of the church dates to the 8th century. Built in a Baroque, cruciform style, it is as you might imagine, inspiring, awesome, overwhelming! The domed basilica houses a number of equally inspiring chapels. On the right, the Chapel of the Holy Family, the Chapel of the Annunciation, the Chapel of the Sacred Heart. To the left, the Chapel of St. Julian the Hospitaller, the Chapel of the Archangel Michael, the Chapel of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, the Chapel of the Crucifix. These Chapels alone contain frescoes and holy paintings enough to fill a museum; they *ARE* a museum! (Continued next week...)
